

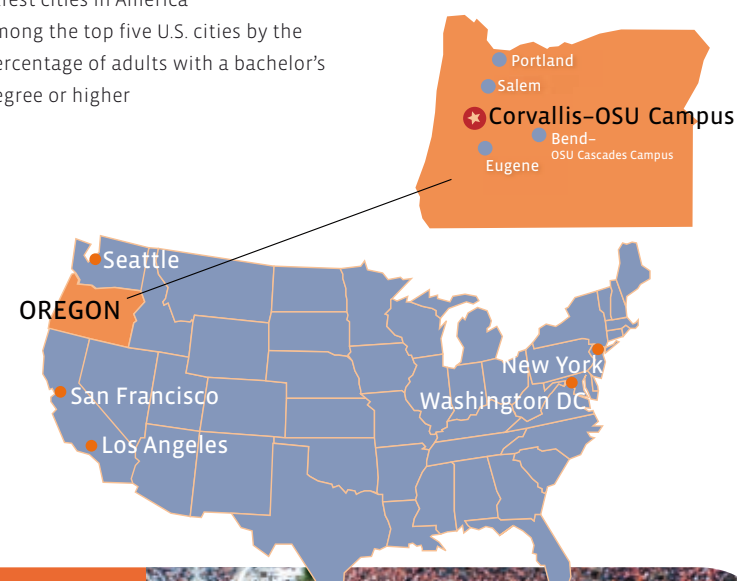


Oregon State University

- top-tier collegiate athletics, including back-to-back baseball national championships in 2006 and 2007.

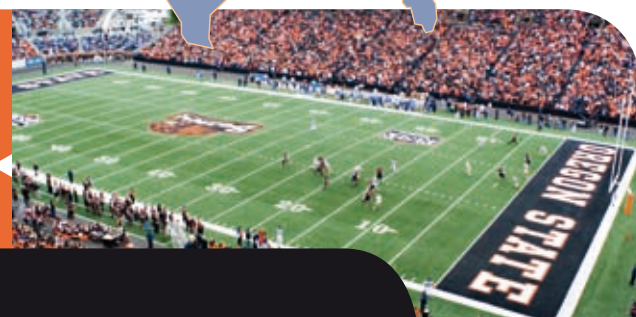
Corvallis, OSU's home city

Portland, the center of Oregon's high-tech economy, is just 90 minutes away and offers non-stop air services to Europe and Asia, as well as to cities across the US.

Oregon State University is a place of renowned academic strength – an inviting place to achieve your academic goals while pursuing personal, recreational and scenic exploration.

With \$231 million in funded research last year, OSU is Oregon's premier research university and one of only 96 institutions in the US to hold the Carnegie Foundation's top research designation for 'very high research activity.' The authoritative Shanghai Jiao Tong Index ranks OSU at 102 in the world rankings, and 59 out of the 2,450 four-year colleges in the USA.

OSU's College of Engineering is among the top 25 largest engineering programs in the USA and offers more engineering majors than any university on the U.S. West Coast. Other top-ranked programs at OSU include forestry, oceanography, nuclear engineering, public health, biochemistry, food science, zoology and ecology.

OSU's 420-acre campus features historic buildings, expansive lawns and a vibrant array of trees and flowers, making it a beautiful place to learn year-round. Students can participate in more than 300 organizations, ranging from the academic and professional to the cultural and spiritual.

INTO OSU undergraduate pathways

The undergraduate pathway programs allow students to complete the first year of a four-year baccalaureate degree by simultaneously combining academic coursework, English language improvement, and the development of academic skills in a comprehensive program of study. Upon successful completion of a pathway program, students will progress to the second year of their undergraduate degree program.¹

Conditional Admission Program (CAP)

This is a full-time program for undergraduate and graduate students who are academically qualified for direct admission to an undergraduate or graduate program at OSU but require additional preparation in English in order to meet the TOEFL entry requirement. These students are 'conditionally' admitted to an academic program at OSU but cannot begin

Minimum entry requirements:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Conditional admission to an undergraduate degree program at OSU requires a TOEFL score of 45-70 iBT (450-524 PBT); or IELTS 4.5-5.5, plus satisfactory completion of high school diploma with a 3.0 GPA or equivalent • Conditional admission to a graduate degree program requires a minimum TOEFL score of 60 iBT (500 PBT) or IELTS 5.0, with a 3.0 GPA or equivalent
Program duration:	• 1 or 2 terms of approximately 10-11 weeks each
Lessons per week:	• Up to 15 credit hours of classroom instruction for undergraduate students or 12 credit hours for graduate students per term. Instruction is a combination of intensive English language study and academic coursework in the major field.
Start dates:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Summer term: June 22, 2009 • Fall term: September 21, 2009 • Winter term: December 30, 2009 • Spring term: March 25, 2010

- 1 Upon successful completion of the pathway program, business and engineering students are admitted to the second year of the Pre-Business or Pre-Engineering undergraduate curriculum. At the end of the second year, they may compete for admission to the professional programs in business or engineering (the standard process for all OSU students in business and engineering majors). - 2 This includes major fields in American Studies, Economics, English, History, Political Science, Environmental Science, Forestry, Health Management and Policy, International Studies, New Media Communication, and many others. For a complete listing of major fields that can be accessed through pathway programs, consult the INTO OSU brochure.
- 3 Progression from Pre-Business and Pre-Engineering into business and engineering upper division degree programs (3rd year) currently requires a minimum of 2.5 GPA in all OSU academic work over Years 1 and 2. All OSU students must meet these criteria and must compete for admission to the third year of study in the Schools of Business and Engineering.
- 4 Most U.S. students find it very difficult to complete all requirements for an undergraduate degree in engineering in four years of study (enrolling 3 terms per year). Due to the number and sequencing of courses in science and engineering for these majors, students enrolling on these pathways must begin in September and enroll at OSU in two 4 credit-hour courses during the summer term of 2010 in order to remain on schedule to enter the second year.

INTO OSU English language programs

Intensive English programs (IEP): Academic English

This intensive academic English program from beginner through advanced levels prepares undergraduate and graduate students for entry into a university degree program. It improves English language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing along with academic skills development. In addition, students may choose from among a number of elective modules such as TOEFL, GRE and GMAT preparation, Advanced Vocabulary Building, Pronunciation and Oral Fluency, English for Tourism, English for Business, American Culture, News and Views, and Movie Making.

Minimum entry requirements:	• High School diploma
Program duration:	• Four terms per year. Minimum enrollment of one term. Each term is 10 or 11 weeks in duration
Lessons per week:	• 23 lessons per week of class work which includes 12-15 lessons of core language skills development; 6 to 9 lessons of elective modules; and at least two hours per week in the Conversant Program. In addition, students are required to engage in at least 20 hours of directed study outside the classroom on research projects, group projects, learning center activities and in daily preparation for classes.

General English

This English program offers general language improvement at beginner to advanced levels for students who wish to focus on developing communicative skills for everyday living and

learning about American culture. Students at intermediate and advanced levels work on refining language skills for professional or personal use.

Minimum age requirement:	• 16 years and above														
Program duration:	• 4-48 weeks														
Lessons per week:	• Organized in 4-week programs of 27 lessons/wk (intensive), 21 lessons/wk (semi-intensive), and 15 lessons/wk (standard) of classroom instruction, which includes core language skills development and up to 9 lessons of learning labs, application of language skills in the OSU and Corvallis community, elective modules, activities, and field trips.

Teacher training

Teacher training workshops are offered each summer for groups of Teachers of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) from around the world. The workshops allow teachers to expand professional networks and exchange ideas on techniques for common classroom challenges. The month-long workshop, taught by an experienced team of ESL professionals, includes:

- Refinement of English language skills
- Exploration of topics in American culture
- Creative teaching techniques

- Special projects (including outcomes-based assessment)
- Design of innovative teaching materials
- Incorporation of technology in teaching

INTO OSU accommodations

INTO Oregon State University's residential accommodations are just a few steps from our teaching and administration center. The suites are spacious, well equipped and laid out in the traditional way for U.S. students, typically with two sharing a bedroom and two of these units sharing an interconnected bathroom. This arrangement is very popular with OSU students. When you reserve your accommodation, you can choose from a variety of catering options, with all meals served in a small mall of restaurants

and cafes next door to the residence hall, as well as around campus.

Accommodations costs, shared room and basic meal plan* starting at:

- 12-month: \$12,000
- 9-month: \$9,000
- 4-week: \$1,132

*Basic meal plan is 2-4 meals/week. Also available are Preferred (8-10 meals/week), Premium (11-14 meals/week) and Ultimate (15-19 meals/week) plans.
